Mechanism of injury associated with rotator cuff strain. Dynamic rotation of the arm at high velocity. Common mechanism for an acute injury to the upper extremity. Overhand activity.

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The bones that comprise the shoulder complex and shoulder joint are the clavicle, scapula, and humerus (Figure 18-2). These three bones form the four major articulations associated with the shoulder complex: the sternoclavicular joint, the acromioclavicular joint, the glenohumeral joint, and the scapulothoracic joint. The Shoulder. -extremely complicated region of the body. -high degree of mobility but compromises stability. -overhead activities--> susceptible to many repetitive and overuse injuries. -movement and stabilization-->integrated function of the rotator cuff muscles, joint capsule and scapula stabilizing muscles.

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Shoulder Impingement Syndrome: Definition. This shoulder injury is caused by a decreased space in the glenohumeral joint, because of tendonitis or bursitis. Term. Falling on an extended arm. Definition. A lot of shoulder sprains, fractures, separations, and dislocations occur from this mechanism of injury.

The shoulder complex, composed of the clavicle, scapula, and humerus, is an intricately designed combination of three joints that links the upper extremity to the thorax. The articular structures of the shoulder complex are designed primarily for mobility, allowing us to move and position the hand through a wide range of space.
